WHAT WE HEARD FINAL REPORT

PROJECT SUMMARY

For the month of June, the City of Lethbridge sought feedback on potentially reducing speed limits in the downtown. The reasoning for the proposed speed reductions was to help in achieving the overall vision for downtown as a vibrant prosperous place that provides a safe and comfortable environment for pedestrians and cyclists. It would also achieve a significant step towards increased transportation safety and the goal of eliminating major injury and fatal collisions on City roads.

As of June 30th when the survey was closed 2204 individual survey responses were received with overwhelming support for **not** reducing speeds within the downtown.

BACKGROUND HISTORY

With the combination of major street construction projects coming forward to improve the environments for both pedestrians (3rd Avenue Reconstruction) and cyclists (4th Avenue and 7th Street Cycling Corridors) along with expanded public seating through sidewalk patios and parklets it was thought to be a good time to explore speed reductions. Further, the City is currently wrapping up its Traffic Safety Plan which will include elements of Vision Zero.

What We Heard Report capturing general levels of public support for reducing speeds in the downtown. If supported, report would be prepared for City Council to make decision on whether to proceed with initiative.

- Survey results and next steps to be shared with public.



WHAT WE HEARD

SURVEY (JUNE 8 – JUNE 30, 2020)

- 2204 individual responses
- Relationship to downtown
 - o Residents 12%
 - o Business owners 4%
 - o Downtown employees 25%
 - Users of downtown (eat, shop, play) 75%
 - o Other 4%
- How often visit downtown
 - o Daily 32%
 - o Weekly 40%
 - o Monthly 19%
 - o Couple times a year 8%
 - Never 1%
- Support for speed reductions
 - o Reduce to 30km/h 12%
 - o Reduce to 40km/h 11%
 - o Maintain speeds at 50km/h 77%
- Observations from cross analysis of results
 - Residents and Users (shop, eat, play, health & fitness) are more supportive (approx. +6%) of speed reductions as opposed to business owners and those who work downtown.
 - Those who go downtown monthly or a few times a year are more supportive (approx. +11%) of speed reductions as opposed to those who frequent daily or weekly.
- A detailed text analysis was not completed given the high volume of responses.
 However, a high level text analysis of why you feel speeds should remain at 50 km/h in the downtown. The top 5 reasons were:
 - 1. People already drive slower than 50 downtown as there are so many lights and crosswalks that already act as speed deterrent
 - 2. If it's not broken, leave it alone.
 - 3. Speed reduction is merely a cash grab.
 - 4. Speed reductions will keep people from going Downtown
 - 5. Speed reduction will hinder traffic flow and increase congestion.






Q2 How often do you visit and spend time (not just drive through) downtown?





The reason I walk downtown instead of along the bike route is because intersections are controlled with lights. I've nearly been hit 3 times at the intersection I live on (6 St and 7 Ave) since I've lived here (2 years). My dog was nearly hit by a

I gives a better response time, adds only minutes to your commute. With the amount of stoplights, stop signs/yield signs and designated crosswalks etc in

the downtown core there should be no reason to reduce it to the same speed as a playground zone or school zone - those a good for ensuring the safety

of children - the downtown core us less likely to have a flock of children crossing the road willy Nilly. For the most part its pedestrian foot traffic that

knows and understands the rules of the road.

I think 50km/hr is too fast for the downtown core. With cars parked along the

streets it is sometimes too hard to see pedestrians waiting to cross, stepping



out between vehicles or coming out to their parked vehicles if you are travelling at that speed. When I go into the downtown I find a place to park and then walk up and down a few blocks shopping etc. It would be nice to be able to safely enter/exit parking spots without people expecting to be able to travel down the streets so fast. I think it would also encourage people to walk the downtown if they felt safer doing so- slow the environment down a bit. At 40km/hr traffic is still moving well but it just creates a safer environment. There are routes people can travel at the regular 50km/hr if they need to get somewhere - these downtown streets do not need to be used as a main routes so the 50km/hr travelling speed is not necessary.

This is the approximate average speed I can travel in the downtown core. 30 is a little slow and could back up traffic during peak times.

30 km is too hard to maintain and is ridiculously slow and would create dangerous situations by needing too keep my eye on the pedometer. i never drive 50, always 40, i think its a good safe speed.

As stated in the preamble to the survey, most drivers are going between 30-40km/h anyway. This is very likely because most drivers are rational and

times don't look both ways. It's time people need to take responsibility and continuing making things slower in the city will just get frustrating, in which,

40km/h anyway. This is very likely because most drivers are rational and prudent drivers. If they are already slowing down to reasonable speeds in the circumstances, why patronize drivers with mandatory restriction without allowing for faster speeds when it is safe? One might suspect the need for certain additional cash flows... Further, for those who obey traffic control devices there is little risk of incident. For those who don't, more danger is their choice to make. Downtown is not, nor should it be, targeted to unsupervised children; apart from them, who else is at risk besides those who disregard traffic laws? There is risk inherent in all activity that cannot ever be eliminated. Due care for one's own safety would be more effective, more practical, do more to discourage unsafe behaviors, and be less draining of city resources than enforcing a reduced driving speed that is 0-10km/h Less than the current norm.

Why not just ban all cars down town and force people to use that stupid park and ride structure you wasted tax payer dollars on. The best way to reduce pedestrian fatality in terms of being hit by a vehicle is to have smarter pedestrians. Not By creating a massive speed trap in the city core of I don't think it is a issue and I feel that will only increase frustration of people traveling in the downtown core.

For stats I'll disclose that I am a 48 yr old Woman with a University degree. We lived on 6 St for 5 yrs and I worked at RBC downtown. This is the area of the City I spend most of my life. If the Average speed is much lower anyway due to the factors stated in your write up then this is a non issue. At non peak times it will be very annoying to have to crawl along at 30. Maybe if we had stats on fatalities that happened in the downtown core I would feel differently. I feel this will just be another area where people are getting ticketed. Because your focus should be on the SCS and not spending tax payers money on altering the downtown core. Traffic flow and volume

(1) The timing of the lights is not set to allow smooth traffic at 30km/hour you can barely avoid running from red light to red light as is. (2) I cannot think of a single time I have witnessed a downtown accident related to speeding in any form or fashion, (3) downtown has a larger problem with light timings wherein one side of traffic has disproportionate time to travel and also encounters shared green light windows with pedestrian walk signs that, during peak times such as lunch, cripples traffic locked behind a single car making a left turn and a single car making a right turn to a sad point where only 1 car in each lane moves forward over the entire duration of a green light, thereby increasing travel time by an additional 1 to 2 minutes. (4) 30 minute speed limits set downtown seem more like a convenient excuse to issue speeding ticket violations to individuals going 31km/per hour than it does to solve an actual problem with driving downtown. Downtown is plagued with a congested right hand turning lane on Scenic drive and the lane next to it with individuals with cars in park as they wait for someone to let them into said right hand lane to merge onto Whoopup drive. (5) The city already caters heavily to cyclists to the detriment of vehicle commuters and the roads are not designed with cyclists in mind. There is no adequate room for a biking lane without eliminating curb side parking and the entire point of operating a motor vehicle is to travel at speeds where you reach your destination faster than riding a bicycle. Again, I have not witnessed in over 20 years a collision downtown that involved the speed limit as the issue. I will state right now that my place of work deals almost exclusively with motor vehicle accident claims and injuries incurred as a result of them. More accidents have occurred from motorists blatantly ignoring the rules of the road, failing to yield at 4 way stops, failing to look both ways, pedestrians AND motorists failing to ensure either the pedestrian or operator of a vehicle has taken notice of them. I see more cyclists riding without helmets, riding through side walks without dismounting to cross. Honestly, the blatant jay walking and disregard for expected safety practices such as a walk signs clearly indicating NOT to cross and failing to operate a bicycle with regard to safety standards/laws are a much greater risk to the public than reducing the 50km/h speed of traffic. All you will accomplish is aggravating good drivers; the same ignorant and outright selfish behaviours exhibited all over Lethbridge will continue to produce the same problems, but more speeding tickets will be issued as



people continue to fight for lane control during peak hours of the day. I wish I could say the speeding tickets actually worked, but there's been no obvious indicating of that either. If the intended purpose of a speed reduction is to make things safer for pedestrians and cyclists, I strongly argue against it as it's more obvious to me that the motorists are often placed at greater risk of reckless behaviour of the pedestrians and cyclists disobeying laws person for person downtown all day long. By creating 50km/hour zones around the city that intersect with multiple 30km/zones even greater frustration and confusion leading to road raging motorists will result. Most motorists cannot seem to grasp that Mayor Magrath is even a 60km/hr zone as more time is spent at 40 to 50. Scenic is difficult to maintain 60 as everyone is doing 70 to 80... whoopup continues to see cars and mostly trucks flying both down and UP to the West side at 100+km/hr with seemingly no fear of law enforcement stopping them. 13 Street South is riddled with people speeding in an attempt to get passed the newly implemented cyclist intersection and from there they attempt to race fast enough to avoid hitting the red light at the intersection near Stubbs pharmacy. Downtown speed isn't the issue, regardless of the stats being provided. You'd be better off reinforcing proper education regarding the rules of operating bicycles as the majority obviously have no idea that a helmet is required and that they must get off of said bicycle while crossing the street on along a cross walk. People aren't even looking as they cross.. they have their faces down in their phones.. for all the worry of distracted drivers.. for the love of god, people are walking across the road and tripping on the curb, because they haven't looked up with their earbuds in and eyes glued to their screens. The problem I have seen downtown (every time I have been there and at varying times of day) are people stumbling around intoxicated ignoring any and all crosswalks, crossing signals and traffic lights. I have actually driven downtown after work in the late evenings (around 11:30) and on multiple occasions when I am the only car in the general area, have had people run out in front of my vehicle. It actually happened last evening (June 9) at about 10:00pm on 3rd Ave heading Westbound. A gentleman ran out, granted he was actually in a crosswalk this time, but didn't press the crossing sign lights or wait for traffic (me) to stop. Just ran out. I had to slam on my brakes to avoid hitting him and if someone had been behind me and was unable to stop, there would have been an accident. They actually just walk or do this little half-run thing right in front of your car totally ignoring traffic laws. They urinate out in the open and nothing is done. So that is what should be reduced "public intoxication." If you want to protect pedestrians then you will



have to protect them from themselves. Trust me if I go downtown it's never for pleasure but only if necessary for this very reason. I used to take the bus from downtown for 6 years straight before I got a vehicle. I NEVER felt unsafe from vehicle traffic doing 50km/hr. jaywalkers and cyclists cutting into traffic, accountable for basic road safety would be more useful. It's not a school zone.

The streets are mostly wide enough and some two lane, there are plenty of sidewalk and pedestrian areas, lots of controlled intersections. One area to consider would be to add in bike areas rather then slowing car traffic.

There has been little incident at this speed and slowing traffic would cause congestion.

Lowering the speed limits for safety at this point is fixing a problem that doesn't exist. The economic cost of slowing down traffic (this includes my own business, as I do property maintenance downtown) would be quite high, given that slower traffic would encourage more pedestrians to ignore traffic signals which would force traffic to stop/slow down even more.

pedestrian/vehicle collisions against the number of pedestrian/vehicle interactions for proper context. The number is incredibly low. Moreover, with all of the options already available to pedestrians (marked crosswalks; traffic lights etc.) their safety is generally protected. This exercise seems like an effort by City Administration to find a problem that doesn't exist.

There are enough traffic lights to slow traffic already. There is no need for a lower speed limit. We are not a big enough city to do this. You will just eliminate more people from going downtown.

I have never felt unsafe trying to cross the street in the downtown area due to traffic speed. The areas with high pedestrian populations are also areas with a traffic light on every block, so the traffic is well controlled. Drivers downtown seem to respect and yield to pedestrians. Drivers who are not cautious will be reckless no matter what the speed limit is.

Changing the speed for drivers is not the answer. Pedestrians are suppose to cross at the crosswalks. If they are not crossing there, that is something that the police should be ticketing. As a driver downtown, I often go less then 50 km/h when there are lots of vehicles around, but at the end of the day or in the evening that doesnt make sense.

There are rarely accidents involving pedestrians downtown. This happens more often in residential neighborhoods. Lower residential speeds alongside, or before downtown.

It feels unnecessary to accommodate a very small number of citizens walking or riding their bikes to and from work. That's why we have crosswalks and traffic lights in place. This is not Vancouver.

We all know the reason for this, we are not blind. The recent influx of transient population who don't follow safe procedures for crossing as cross walks are causing the general public to have to be more cautious.

Regardless if the speed is 30, 40 or 50 Kph these individuals will continue to dart out between parked cars, cross on green lights or in the middle roads. Who is going to enforce the speed limit, police are already taxed to the hilt with other issues. This city wastes so much money on stuff that does not need to be addressed. I ride my bike to work daily, on the main road with traffic as the Rules of the Road AR304/2002 dictate. I have never once used any bike lane. Nor would I ever go so far out of my way to use one to get where I am going. These projects are used solely as a gimmick to sway public perception. Millions of dollars wasted! This project on reducing speeds is no different. The realignment of third avenue to make wider walk ways is useless as most residents of Lethbridge do not feel safe to walk downtown due the the drug problem. modelling indicates 37 seconds for the average, however, during times of higher traffic (events, rush hours, etc), reducing the speed will cause significant congestion within the core. Minimal pedestrian accidents occur within the core currently and often pedestrians that are struck do not take proper precautions when crossing the street (either cross illegally or without checking for vehicle traffic), leaving the drivers to be cautious. Slowing the speed limit to 30/40kph will only encourage unsafe pedestrian crossing as it would give a false sense of safety and time to cross, again leaving the driver to stop quickly. The city should instead put out statements regarding proper ways to cross streets and to do so with caution rather than just walking out onto a crosswalk without looking - as I have often noted to be the case in the core.

Reducing speeds would increase "missing the light" which is a current cause of frustration and would likely lead to more drivers running yellow lights (more dangerous). I currently drive downtown 4-5+ time's a day, and walk a few blocks at least a few times a day. Although the calculation might technically be 37 seconds, in reality it would likely add slightly more time to my commute. This would possibly be the difference between being able to go home on my lunch break to let me dog out, and not being able to fit it in my 30 minute lunch break. As you mentioned on the previous page, many vehicle users travel between 30-40km/hr. This means that 50km/hr (as a MAXIMUM speed) is sufficient. It means drivers are responding to the surrounding conditions, and drive slower when required / comfortable to do so. Speed should be a function of design, and as mentioned, the presence of parking and signalization controls the speed in most situations. How would you change the design of the roadways to physically be designed for 30km/hr. Chicanes? speed humps? Only placing signage is not enough. Physically posting lower speed limits only increases a demand for enforcement. The questions must be asked - are vehicles



travelling between 30km/hr and 50km/hr when the conditions allow for it the problem? Is this a good use of enforcement time and money? Generally the more serious collisions with pedestrians happen at speeds greater than 50km/hr. The important enforcement needs to be what should already be occurring - monitoring vehicles driving in excess of 50km/hr. I don't believe that having the speed at 50km/hr is making the downtown a "place to pass through quickly". And I don't believe that reducing the speed in the downtown will create a 'destination'. Creating a vibrant downtown community is a complex process that involves the integration of all modes of transportation. I believe it is more beneficial to focus on these other social aspects of improving the downtown vibrancy, rather than attempt to lower the posted maximum speed limit when your data is showing that the travel speed of most vehicle users is not a problem.

First, more information is required to make a decision: if the goal is to "eliminate major injury and fatal collisions", the City needs to collect data (and present it to us survey-takers) about how many major injuries and fatal collisions attributable to speed have occurred in the downtown area over the last few years. Personally I know of none, however I'm aware this may not be the case. Second, as a resident I feel that regardless of what the limit is set at, people will still choose to ignore it: all it takes is one Friday or Saturday night sitting on the corner of 3 Ave and 5 St to see that we have plenty of street racers who have no regard for the existing limits, much less a lower one. Enforcement is practically non-existent. Third, until 3 Ave is no longer seen as the major thoroughfare that it is (until the sidewalk widening project takes place, and until traffic flow on it can be restricted), it will continue to act as the secondmost popular way of "cutting across the city" from Scenic Dr to Mayor Magrath Dr after 6 Ave. One way of doing this would be to cut off vehicle traffic entirely between 5 St and 7 St: this would force traffic to go around on 1 Ave to Stafford Dr or take 6 Ave all the way east. This option would, however, be detrimental to the businesses along that section of roadway, although perhaps it could be turned into a "limited access street" with bollards or some other traffic flow-limitation devices.
